### **STEM Program at Cromer**

Congratulations to Ms McLachlan our head teacher of science and her team. We are one of 12 schools selected to participate in a STEM (<u>S</u>cience, <u>T</u>echnology, <u>E</u>ngineering and <u>M</u>athematics) program with the University of Sydney. The program will involve professional learning for our teachers so that we can deliver a STEM program here at school and includes access to some of the incredible STEM work occurring at Sydney University. In 2017 and beyond, dedicated STEM teaching periods will be provided in years 7 and 8 in 2 of the upstairs science labs which have been converted to deliver this program. When students reach year 11 and 12 they will then be able to specialise into their chosen areas of <u>S</u>cience, <u>T</u>echnology, <u>E</u>ngineering and <u>M</u>athematics (STEM) through the wide range of HSC subjects offered in each of these areas.

### From the English Faculty... End of Term 3 Report

In Term 3, Year 7 students were introduced to a concept study. At high school, students learn to explore concepts and apply their understanding of techniques to analyse the way these ideas are represented in novels, non-fiction texts, picture books and film. At Cromer Campus, we have explored "Difference" through a close study of Tim Burton's classic, Edward Scissorhands. Before studying the film, 7G were given the challenge of using their phones to demonstrate a range of camera shots. Can you find the following: a long shot, a low angle shot, an undershot, an overshot, a behind shot, an extreme close shot and a high angle shot?

Year 8 have had fun exploring Will's World this term. Students developed a portfolio in which they wrote a playscript, designed a costume or set, and performed a Shakespearean monologue.

On September 15, Year 9 held their Public Awareness Campaign showcase. Working collaboratively, students applied their skills to develop a series of print and visual texts about topics such as Bullying, Animal Welfare, Obesity and Poverty.

Year 10 also impressed us with their creative compositions. Throughout Term 3, our classes undertook a genre/auteur study. Students who studied Tim Burton as an auteur in Ms Roberts' class particularly impressed markers with their original graphic novels while students in 100 and 10P took us on a series of thrilling road trips.

### **Make Online Payments**

It is now possible for parents to make online payments to the school for amounts owing for students, via a secure payment page hosted by Westpac. Payments can be made using either a Visa or MasterCard credit or debit card, and can be made via computer, tablet or mobile phone. The payment page is accessed from the front page of the schools website by selecting <u>\$ Make a payment</u>

Items that can be paid include voluntary school contributions, subject contributions, excursions, sales to students and creative and practical arts activities (these include band, drama and dance). There is also a category called 'Other' this to cover items not covered in the previous headings, Other can be used to make a complete payment of a school invoice.

When you access the <u>\$ Make a payment</u> you must enter:

- the students name, and
- class and reference number OR
- the students name, and
- date of birth.

These details are entered each time you make a payment as student information is not held within the payment system. There is also the option to enter the Student Registration Number and Invoice number, these are not used at our school, please leave blank.

This is a secure payment system hosted by Westpac to ensure that your credit/debit card details are captured in a secure manner, these details are not passed back to the school.

You have the ability to check and change any details of the payment before the payment is processed. Receipts can be emailed and/or printed.

Details of the payments are passed daily to the school where they will be receipted against your child's account. As a receipt has been issued from the payment page a further receipt will not be issued by the school.

# Year 10 Work Experience

download now

All Year 10 students will participate in Work Experience from Monday 5<sup>th</sup> December until Friday 16<sup>th</sup> December. Students need to organise their own placements with the help and support from Ms Bird.

### Frequently asked Questions:

### When can students undertake work experience?

- Students can participate in work experience from the age of 14
- Year 10 work experience can only operate during term time.
- Students under 15 years cannot work before 7am or after 6pm



### Will my child be paid?

No. Students are classified as "voluntary workers: and host employers are not required to make any payment to them. Any payment to a student may invalidate the department's insurance and indemnity arrangements.

### How far will my child need to travel?

Most placements occur within commuting distance of home.

For placements away from home there must be exceptional educational value and the transport, accommodation and overnight supervision arrangements must have the written approval of the Principal.

All travel is at the student's expense. Parents must be satisfied that the travel arrangements can be safely managed by their child.

What about Insurance and Indemnity?

The Department has insurance arrangements for students injured while participating in approved workplace learning, including students injured while travelling directly to and from the workplace.

### The Student Placement Record

All contacts, arrangements and approvals relating to your child's work experience will be recorded on their Student Placement Record.

The Student Placement Record lists:

- Work arrangements (start and finish times, lunch breaks, clothing requirements etc.)
- > Tasks undertaken during the placement
- Any pretraining required
- Your child's Medicare number
- Emergency contacts
- Any additional support needed

### All Student Placement Records must be returned to Ms Bird by Friday 18<sup>th</sup> November.

### How can you best help your child with Work Experience?

Before the placement:

- > Encourage your child to discuss with you their career interests and work preferences
- Suggest they visit <u>www.myfuture.edu.au</u> for find out more information about industries and related careers
- > Discuss what they hope to learn from the placement
- > Ensure that the Student Placement record is completed and returned to Ms Bird on time

When a placement is confirmed:

- > Think about rescheduling other activities during the work experience time
- > Help your child prepare their clothing and any other requirements
- > Ensure that your child has safe travel arrangements to and from work
- > Ensure they have the information they need for the first day: starting time, address, contact person etc.
- Check meal arrangements

During the placement:

- Have a conversation about their day at work:
  - Tell me about the things you did today
  - Have you learnt anything unexpected or particularly interesting?
  - Describe the workplace to me
  - Do you think you might pursue this as a career?
