From the Principal

Attached is an extract of the speech I delivered at this week's presentation night, it is a speech in which I outlined with great pride some of the successes the school has had in 2016. I wish all members of the Cromer Campus community a safe, happy and restful festive season.

It has been a great year at Cromer Campus in 2016. At the beginning of the year we had a very successful open night. It was very well attended and has culminated in an increased enrolment for next year's year 7 which in 2017 will be the biggest cohort in the school. We expect that this pattern will continue in the coming years. This has been the result of a lot of hard work by staff and students alike and focussed on two key areas.

The first area is literacy where the school in 2016 implemented a twenty minute per day focussed literacy lesson for every student in the school. After only a few short months of running this program we were able to look at our year 9 NAPLAN results and found that improvements were already visible in reading, writing, and spelling. This was not expected so early and is a testament to the quality of the program, the hard work of our students and teachers and the literacy team led by Ms Elizabeth DeMontfort that has been the driving force behind this whole school improvement.

The second focus area has been on PBeL (Positive Behaviour Engaged Learners). In this area we have also seen some incredible work. A reinvigorated merit system, new signage around the school and in every learning space, and many other positive changes that have greatly enhanced student engagement at school. The PBeL team, the welfare team, the Deputy Principals and our student year advisers led by Ms Fiona Bird have done an incredible job and as a result what we call negative incidents have decreased every term over the last two years. The result of all of this work is that students at Cromer Campus are more engaged and learning more in their classrooms.

Other accomplishments this year have included the release of our parent portal, a huge increase in the membership of our Facebook site, and a real reinvigoration of student leadership opportunities at Cromer Campus. Thanks for these initiatives must go to Mr Taylor, Ms Bonello and Mrs Norvill. A highlight of this year has been the growth in our music program. We now have a wonderful concert band, quartets, guitar groups, rock bands in most year groups, and a choir. The school is blessed with some very talented students including but not limited to percussionists, vocalists, guitarists and students playing a vast array of instruments. This program has grown to now be a strength of our great school. Next year the students and teachers are again looking forward to the many performance opportunities, camps, tours and in school concerts. Also next year every student in year seven will be introduced to the violin as the foundation of future string groups in the school. I would like to acknowledge the very hard work of Mr McKee who has been the driving force behind this, Ms Masi for her work with the choir and our band director Miss Rachel Rule for this

incredible reinvigoration of music at Cromer Campus. I would also like to acknowledge the P&C band committee that have also supported this reinvigoration and sincerely thank the parents involved for their commitment and hard work. The future of music and the musical opportunities for students at Cromer is very bright indeed.

The Department of Education are supporting the school and next year have funded the complete redevelopment of two of our science laboratories and 5 of our classrooms. The beautification of the school has continued, the focus this year has included new signage around the school in our quadrangle, at the school entrances and most importantly in our classrooms and learning spaces. We allocated resources to our gymnasium, including its change rooms and over January some landscaping will occur in the grounds around the school's entrances.

This year and since I have been here as Principal I have spoken a lot to the students about high expectations. I am sure that students must be getting sick of me saying that I want every student to do their best and that I care about each and every student, I want every child to be successful in whatever it is they are doing now and what they are going to achieve in the future. I say this so often and so publicly for one very clear reason, and that is **I MEAN IT.**

I am very excited about the future of Cromer Campus. Next year the school will continue consolidating our literacy programs and PBeL initiatives but will shift its focus to what educators call visible learning. This term encapsulates a lot. Visible learning briefly put stands for research backed approaches to enhancing teaching and learning that make the **most** difference.

We are also very passionate about a STEM pathway being offered in 2017 for all students at Cromer Campus from year seven to year twelve. STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. Beginning next year all year seven and eight students will be enjoying dedicated STEM lessons with the option to choose STEM as an elective in years nine and ten and then of course the opportunity to specialise further in years eleven and twelve by choosing the offered technology, mathematics, science and engineering subjects already offered at our school. To supplement this program and the achievements already made in literacy, students will also have the chance to study dedicated numeracy lessons from year seven to year ten. It is these exciting new directions, the many accomplishments already achieved and the confidence I have in my staff and students and the increasing support of the Cromer Campus community that I am so excited about the bright future of our great school.

I conclude this speech by thanking the P&C, the staff and congratulating our wonderful students for their great achievements in 2016.



There was a challenging talk about global empathy – just because there is an issue on the other side of the world with which we have no personal connection – does not mean that we shouldn't care. Empathy does not have bounds and we should not confine empathy to our local context. We have all come away feeling inspired to have a multicultural day at Cromer Campus next year.

Nara University High School tour December 2016



It is always invaluable to meet and interact with students from another culture and a fun day was had by all.







School travel 2017 Application information Nov 2016

Information for parents, guardians and students

Our school has partnered with Transport for NSW to use the new online process for you to submit school travel applications.

This means we will be able to process your applications online, making it easier and faster for parents, guardians and students to apply for school travel.

Applications for school travel in 2017 are now open, including for travel to Mascot and Green Square station and for private ferries. Parents, guardians and students are encouraged to apply as soon as they are able via:

Applications for 2017 school travel are now open via www.transportnsw.info/school-students

A new application is required when:

- · applying for a School Opal card or travel pass for the first time,
- enrolling in Kindergarten, or
- requesting an additional entitlement as a result of a shared parental responsibility situation.

You will need to do an update application if the student has a current school travel pass and:

- is progressing from Year 2 to Year 3,
- is progressing from Year 6 to Year 7, or
- changes address, or
- changes school or campus.

Already have a School Opal card or travel pass?

- When you've updated, and you are eligible for free school travel next year, Transport for NSW will send you an email confirmation once your application has been processed. For travel in rural or regional NSW, we'll also inform your nominated transport operator(s).
- If you already have a School Opal card that does not need updating, or you've successfully re-applied, the Opal card will automatically be updated for travel next year. Do not throw it out as you'll be able to use it when the school year starts in 2017.
- If you currently have a printed travel pass provided by your transport operator, a new
 pass will be will be ready at the beginning of the new school year.
