Stage 6 Literacy

What do we do and why?

Literacy is commonly identified as an essential 21st Century Skill. In other words, no matter what industry our students move into, the ability to read, write, organise and think critically are paramount to success.

In Years 7-10, students complete a program that is guided by a range of Oxford English textbooks. Students undertake regular assessments to monitor growth. The significant growth in NAPLAN this year at Cromer Campus shows that Literacy classes are having a positive impact on student performance.

Our Year 11-12 program is developed at the school so it can be tailored to the needs of our students. Literacy is a compulsory component of the day (9:30-9:50). At the start of Year 11, students spend time developing study strategies and time management skills. They then move on to looking at a range of scaffolds for writing. A key message is the importance of planning. Success requires a sustained effort and a resilient approach. For our seniors, Literacy is an opportunity to develop skills for study and gain mentorship from a teacher as they move through the HSC years.

This term Year 12 students are undertaking an Academic Writing module. So far, students have practised paraphrasing and summarising, and learned about modals, nominalisation and transition signals. In Weeks 6-10, students will look at the given/new as well as cohesive devices that help to ensure synthesis. Each Monday, Mrs Fairley leads the year group to help to introduce these complex topics. In smaller classes (Wednesdays and Thursdays), students apply their understanding by modifying words or identifying features of language in sample HSC responses. As we understand the importance of student wellbeing in Year 12, Friday is set aside for mentoring and planning the week ahead.


The Literacy Team hopes that students will come to develop the vocabulary, register and sentence structures required to demonstrate their knowledge at a higher level. To assess, justify and evaluate are requirements in most subjects, so it is important for students to understand that it's not enough to *know* the content. Executing an argument through purposeful manipulation of language <u>will</u> make a difference. Please see the following page for a snapshot of our Term 4 Senior Literacy Program.



Certain behaviours and dispositions assist students to become effective learners who are confident and motivated to use their literacy skills broadly. Many of these behaviours and dispositions are also identified and supported in other general capabilities. They include students managing their own *learning to be self-sufficient;* working harmoniously with others; being open to ideas, opinions and texts from and about diverse cultures; returning to tasks to improve and enhance their work; and being prepared to question the meanings and assumptions in texts."

English in Education, Work and Community is a compulsory component of the Preliminary English Studies course. In 2017, Ms Bird and Mrs Fairley applied for a grant to support our English Studies students to develop a range of workplace skills.

Working with Ms Roberts in Term 3, we worked to build links with the community to give the class real-world experiences. One great discovery was Dawn Toynton from Love Your Work Career Counselling.

After meeting with Dawn, Ms Roberts arranged for students to undertake a personalised questionnaire. Dawn then came in and held a Boardroom meeting with the group to deliver the results.

It was refreshing for students to hear Dawn delivering messages that are consistent with our own: you do not have to decide on a career now. In fact, it is estimated that our teenagers will have a variety of careers in their lifetime. The key is knowing who you are, understanding your strengths and following pathways that are suited to your personality and interests. 

Transitioning into Year 11...

It sounds like a cliché, but the shift from Year 10 into Year 11 is a big leap. Here's some tips to get set up for Term 1, 2018:

- Purchase any required pens, highlighters, scissors, glue, calculators and rulers. If you do not own any of these items, sort it out before the first day back. An efficient student is an organised student.
- Purchase a folder to bring to school every day. Some students like to use an A4 book for each subject while others like to work on loose-leaf paper. If you choose the later, invest in some dividers. You will get lots of hand outs, so have plastic sleeves to file your sheets away. You will need books on your first day of school. The hard work starts on Day 1.
- Purchase a folder for each different subject. Have these folders set up in an accessible place so you can file your notes away. You will have to keep coming back to your modules throughout the year.
- Set up a calendar so you can write down important dates. You MUST submit your assessments on time in your Preliminary year.
- Purchase a small whiteboard. You can set yourself short-term goals by listing all the tasks you have to complete. Whether it be homework, chunking of assignments or filing that needs to be done, making it visible keeps you accountable.
- Get a study planner. Time management is the secret to success. Allocate time for rest, work and play.
- Be IT ready. You are preparing for a digital world. Many of our senior students use laptops in class to complete work and undertake further research. Your teachers will use Google Classroom, Edmodo and/or OneNote. Get familiar with Google Drive, USBs, email and Edmodo. There are many ways to back up your work. You need to have assignments ready to print. *"My printer is out of ink"* won't cut it in Year 11.
- If you don't have access to a computer or the internet at home, work out where you will get your work done. Dee Why and Warringah Mall libraries are free to use. You will also need to make effective use of the computers dedicated to seniors in the Cromer Campus library.
