P&C Working Bee

Thanks to all the parents and families who completed another Sunday working bee at our school. Our gardens have never looked better.

Construction / Upgrades at Cromer Campus

Administration Upgrade – Completed. There are a few finishing touches remaining, including rehanging student artwork in the foyer and turning on the school's security cameras.

Roofs – The unsightly construction fences around our school are largely due to the work occurring on the school's roofs. Most of this work is not visible except for the eaves and new guttering. This much needed renewal is approaching completion.

Student Toilets – There is now an exclusive set of toilets for Year 11 and 12 students in A-block. Renovation work has begun on two sets of toilet blocks in S-block. Upon completion of this work, we will have an increased number of student toilets across the school.

Multi-Purpose Outdoor Court – The outside netball/basketball/volleyball court has been demolished and a new surface is being laid to supplement the school sporting areas. Upon completion the school will have four multi-purpose courts (one inside, one outside and two outside under the COLA) and a full-size oval.

Carpeting / Painting – Almost half of the school's 60 learning spaces have had either new carpet or new painting work.

Bus Bay – Northern Beaches Council has committed to erecting safety fences along the length of the bus bay to control pedestrian access to buses and to South Creek Road. The safety of students is of crucial importance to the council and school, and I welcome this upgrade. Upon completion students attempting to cross South Creek Road will need to use the crossings adjacent to the school gates and will not be able to cross the road from the bus bay.

Mobile Phones

Next term the Department of Education will be releasing its policy on mobile phones. I have not yet seen this policy and therefore cannot share the details, but as we all know, it was announced by the premier of our state that mobile phones will be banned in high schools from Term 4 this year. This ban will mean that some things will change, for example, communication with your child during school hours can be made through our school's front office and this should only be done if it is absolutely essential or in case of an emergency. I am reminded of life many years ago - we did not have mobile phones and therefore did not need them, and we were okay. I have already discussed this openly with students at a recent school assembly. It is clear the existence of mobile phones has hindered learning opportunities in most educational settings and while I don't yet know the details of the incoming policy, I do know that your support to make this work will be required. I encourage you, if you haven't already, to begin discussing and planning this change with your children.

Parent Teacher Nights - Next Term

Parent Teacher Nights will occur in Weeks 1 and 2 of next term. I look forward to meeting and talking to parents at those events. Dates can be found in this newsletter (page 7). Email instructions and an invitation will be sent this week. For new parents to our school Parent Teacher Nights are arranged by surname, not by year groups. This is especially helpful if you have more than one child at the school as you only need to attend one evening.

A trip to Kimbriki Resource Recovery Centre



As part of our Science Unit on sustainability, Integrated Studies enjoyed an excursion to the Kimbriki Resource Recovery Centre in Terrey Hills. Kimbriki is the main hub for recycling in the Northern Beaches Council area. Its recycling, composting and landfill diversion services see 80% of the waste that comes into Kimbriki recycled rather than go to landfill.

Our buses were able to get a tour of the facility, including areas that the general public does not see. The students enjoyed seeing the

huge volumes of waste, recyclables and recycled materials as well as the large trucks, loaders and other machinery. Morning tea was enjoyed in the Eco

House Garden, and some of the students were able to experience the composting toilets!



The tour was completed with a lesson in the ways in which we can live more sustainably and stop waste from ending up in landfill. We learnt how to make and manage a composting system, with some hands-on

practice turning the compost and looking after the compost worms.



It was an enjoyable day for everyone, and the students are very enthusiastic to find ways to make Integrated Studies more sustainable and environmentally friendly over the rest of 2023.

Community Access Class 8/9A visit Manly Art Gallery



On Tuesday May 2nd Class 8/9A had a community access visit to Manly Art Gallery to view the work of aboriginal Dhungtatti artist Blak Douglas. First we caught the 179 bus from school to Dee Why with Miss Bailley's class, then our class swapped buses and continued to Manly Wharf on the 199. After that we walked along the walkway at the harbour to the shell sculpture for a break. Unfortunately, the steam no longer comes out of the shell.

Next Miss Bonello gave us instructions and asked us to jump up onto the shell for a photo. Following that we walked to the white chairs near the old aquarium where at last, we had morning tea.



After morning tea, we explored the old aquarium building and discovered what Manly was like in the olden days through a timeline story walk. There used to be a walkway and slides out in the harbour but a big storm in 1974 came all the way from Darwin and knocked it down. We had another photo taken here because the old Marineland building is going to be knocked down and not replaced. We will now be able to remember this in our future to tell others.



Finally, we went to the art gallery to see the work of the artist Blak Douglas on his depiction of Manly Cove. We saw paintings and sculptures and a video about a girl seeing if a thong fits her foot or not. We didn't really understand the video. Some of us stood under a hanging sculpture and had our picture taken between the apostrophes. It looked amazing and felt satisfying, calming, and relaxing to see all the artist's works.



Later we painted our own watercolour painting of Manly Cove. Some painted the wharf or ferries and the surrounding area. It was quite relaxing sitting on the grass hill painting. Afterward, we bought our lunch from a variety of places including Guzman Gomez and Fish and Lemonade. Subsequently, we ate it back on the shell sculpture near where the ferries dock. On the way home we caught the 199 to Dee Why and the 179 back to school.

Overall, we had a great day at Manly and thoroughly enjoyed our visit to the Manly Art Gallery, delicious lunch and painting scenes of Manly Cove.

To provide passengers with a more reliable timetable, from **Monday 17th July 2023** Keolis Downer Northern Beaches has been approved to adopt a temporary, adjusted timetable for bus services in the Northern Beaches and Lower North Shore.

In response to industry-wide driver shortages, Transport for NSW has approved a temporary change to the timetable to reduce the number of ad hoc bus cancellations.

The temporary reduced timetable has been designed to improve the predictability and visibility of available services, allowing passengers to better plan their journey using online trip planning.

Transport for NSW will work with Keolis Downer to monitor performance and driver numbers to ensure the return the full timetable as soon as possible.

Keolis Downer Northern Beaches are committed to returning to a full timetable and is taking active measures to attract new drivers to address the industry-wide shortage.

"We know that our services are not meeting passenger expectations and we are working hard to get more drivers safely on to the road to return services to where they need to be," a Keolis Downer Spokesperson said.

"The changes are focused on high-frequency route corridors and mainly affect peak hour routes to the CBD and North Sydney.

"The adjusted timetable also allows us to shift services during peak hour, so our passengers will have a more reliable frequency."

In addition to the temporary changes being introduced across the network, there will also be some permanent changes to services in Avalon in response to recent road and traffic upgrades. These include routes 191, 192, 190X and the 199.

The only changes to school services are Northern Beaches Secondary College Manly Campus and route 177 which will now accommodate new bell times set by the campus.

"To help our passengers with the changes, we will have Customer Service Officers at key bus stops during peak times to provide information on alternative services, other than the B-Line, that will get customers to their destination," the spokesperson said.

Notification posters will also be placed on affected bus stops.

"Keolis Downer Northern Beaches acknowledges the impact that bus cancellations have had for our passengers. We appreciate their patience and understanding whilst we work through the challenge of the current bus driver shortage and encourage anyone interested in becoming a driver visit <u>getbehindthewheel.com.au.</u>" the spokesperson said.

Passengers are reminded to check the <u>Trip Planner</u> before they travel.

Compulsory School Attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards for homeschooling

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partia absence and must be explained by parents

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as univertified When this homeone the unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and ther contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school





My child won't go to school. What should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a Improve autericative may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptabl absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education and

Department of Education and Communities may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

School Travel Passes

Students who require a School Opal card or travel pass but have not yet applied need to apply or update their details as soon as possible.

In the Opal network, students should travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their <u>local bus operator</u> to discuss their travel needs.

New Student Opal cards (including new Term Bus Passes) will be sent to the student's nominated postal address within two weeks of their application being approved.

Students living in rural and regional areas will receive their travel pass from their nominated transport operator. It may be issued via their school or be sent directly to them at home. **Note**: some rural and regional operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

Terms of Use

Students using Opal cards must tap on and tap off in line with the Opal terms of use.

All students are required to comply with the <u>Student code of conduct</u>. The code of conduct aims to ensure the safety and well-being of school children and other passengers. It is important that parents ensure their child is aware of this, as failure to comply with the code of conduct can result in a suspension from travel.

Reporting retailers of illegal nicotine e-cigarettes

Electronic cigarettes or e-cigarettes are battery operated devices that heat a liquid (or e-liquid) to produce a vapour to inhale. Using an e-cigarette is sometimes called 'vaping'.

E-cigarettes come in many shapes and sizes and can be made to look like everyday items including highlighters, pens or USB memory sticks. E-liquid contains a range of chemicals or flavours, and often contains nicotine.

In NSW, the sale of e-cigarettes and e-liquids that contain nicotine is illegal. Selling tobacco or e-cigarettes to minors is also illegal. NSW Health is seeing an increase in the sale of nicotine containing e-cigarettes, including to minors.

NSW Health takes non-compliance with tobacco and e-cigarette lays seriously and NSW Health officers undertake inspections of retailers to ensure they are complying with the laws.

Wellbeing and Safety of Cromer Campus Student Drivers and their Passengers

As is the case with many secondary schools, more and more of our senior students are driving to and from school. While most young drivers are careful, safety conscious and considerate when driving, they are one of the most vulnerable road user groups. Travelling with teenage passengers adds to the risk for these young drivers.

With this in mind, Cromer Campus has a responsibility to take all reasonable measures to ensure the wellbeing and safety of students. Our *Student Driving Policy* outlines what we expect from student drivers and their passengers. A copy of the policy is available on our school web site or can obtained from the school office.

A Parent Permission and Student Agreement Form for both drivers and passengers can also be found on the school web site or obtained from the school office. All student drivers and parents/guardians are required to sign this form and return it to the school.

Please note: There is no parking available for students on school grounds.

Cromer Campus Policy for Students Driving Cars to School

Any student who holds a valid NSW licence and intends to drive to school, either on a regular basis or occasionally, must comply with the school policy and is required to complete the Parent Permission and Student Agreement Form.

Cromer Campus Policy:

- 1. Students are required to adhere to all road rules and drive in a safe and responsible manner.
- 2. Student licence details and car make and registration must be recorded with the school.
- 3. Students are only to use their car for travelling to and from school.
- 4. Students are not permitted to go to their car during the school day.
- 5. Students are not to use their cars at lunchtime or in their study periods
- 6. Students are not permitted to carry other students as passengers to and from school or school events without the written permission of their parent/guardian and the passenger's parent/guardian. The Passenger Permission Form must be completed and submitted to the office.
- 7. Students are required to notify the school of any passenger who may be travelling with them to and from school as per the Passenger Permission Form.
- 8. Student drivers, a parent/guardian and, if relevant, the parent/guardian of any passenger, must sign the Parent permission and Student Agreement Form.
- 9. Cromer Campus does not have space available for student parking. Consequently no student is permitted to park their car within the school grounds.
- 10. The school's Welfare and Discipline Policy will apply where students fail to meet these obligations. Any unsafe driving behaviour or breaches of road rules will be reported to the police.
